OVERVIEW & MISSION STATEMENT

Tower Hamlets Local History Library and Archives (THLHLA) is central to the borough it serves. It collects, preserves, manages and provides free public access to an extraordinary range of archives, library and other historical material

The service provides facilities for onsite research with these collections and delivers outreach, exhibitions and events. These activities engage residents and visitors with the rich history of London's East End.

The service is operated by the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. THLHLA sits within Customer Services in the Resources directorate and is a part of the Idea Store department of libraries and lifelong learning.

The year was spent focusing on adding to our collections and seeking to increase our visibility within the council. Our outreach staff worked hard to produce onsite and online public events and resumed our popular workshops for schools.

During 2022-23 we:

- Continued to enhance our online digital content, adding new user guides to music and our sound collection and developing activity on social media
- Procured Preservica, our first ever preservation system to preserve digital archives. We began testing and adding records
- Acquired 82 linear shelf metres of archive collections. These included over 80 transfers of records from the decant of the former Town Hall at Mulberry Place
- Added 1,366 new archive and library descriptions the online catalogue
- Prepared our application to The National Archives to retain Accredited status
- Delivered 79 events, reaching 1,930 people
- Retrieved 5,528 items from our collections for our readers over the course of 1,183 Reading Room visits

CIPFA survey results

We participated in the biannual **CIPFA Survey of Visitors to UK Archives 2022**. Our results showed that:

- Our overall rating was 9.6/10
- Readers particularly appreciated our staff availability, attitude and quality of advice, scoring 9.9/10 in each category
- 96% of readers found the evidence they were looking for, with 91% learning something unexpected during their research session
- There was room for improvement in the speed of our public PCs and usability of our online catalogue



Communities of Liberation

We were delighted to convene a steering group for our new programme of work entitled Communities of Liberation.

This is a strand of new research and public engagement which will illustrate the long history of African people in the East End, highlighting stories of those who lived here during the time of the Transatlantic Slave Trade.

Research will identify the specific places where African people lived, worked or socialised in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and link them to modern locations in present day Tower Hamlets.

The steering group advises on strategic development, recruitment and fundraising for this piece of work which will result in new artwork being created and a public memorial for the borough.



Town Hall move: New Archives from the Council

A wide range of council records including minutes, photos, maps, plans and brochures were transferred to THLHLA as council departments rationalised their filing systems during the move from Mulberry Place to the new Town Hall in Whitechapel.

As the building emptied, our Archivists spent 132 hours surveying and providing advice to ensure that historically significant materials were preserved and deposited with us for safekeeping.

Thanks are due to our former archivist Medha Chotai for her hard work on this before her departure.

These records require processing, repackaging and cataloguing before they are accessible to the public. They add to our oldest local authority archives, which go back to 1593!

A case study of our work supporting the decant of the old Town Hall features in the annual publication [A Year In Archives 2023](#).

Over 90 individual collections include records from Public Health, School Buildings, Democratic Services and other teams.

Highlights include:

- Metropolitan Borough of Poplar deeds and registers of property dating from the 1800s
- Records of Unison (Tower Hamlets branch), with cartoons and photographs from the 1970s
- Records relating to services for the local Bengali community such as the Community Language Service
- Photographs of the 1995 Blur concert at Mile End Stadium

Welcome to Annette Mackin, our newest member of staff

In January 2023 we welcomed a new member of staff, Annette Mackin, as Heritage Officer (Archives). Annette is an archivist who has lived in Poplar her whole life.

Jumping in at the deep end, her first task was to assist the Archives Manager in appraising council records from the former Town Hall at Mulberry Place for transfer to the archives here.

She is also leading on adding material to our new digital preservation system, and you will find her on the Reading Room enquiry desk every week too.

Black History and Mental Health

An all-day workshop in partnership with **Tower Hamlets African and Caribbean Mental Health Organisation** (THACMHO), connecting Black history with mental health was held during Black History Month in October 2022.

The morning concentrated on the pioneering community work that took place in the borough in the 1980s, with guest speaker Archibald McAllister, formerly of THACA (Tower Hamlets African Caribbean Association).

The afternoon focused on mental health, with a presentation on the history of THACMHO, followed by a panel discussion with Valerie Graham and Charles Brown.

Tuesday coffee mornings

Between January and March 2023 we hosted weekly coffee mornings for older African-Caribbean borough residents. These were hosted by **Newham African Caribbean Resource Centre** (NAC) on behalf of Tower Hamlets Council. These meetups, held each Tuesday in our Education Room were opportunities to socialise and engage in creative activities, including:

- Reminiscence and sharing memories
- Gentle movement and music appreciation
- Health information, such as advice on diabetes, CHD, stroke, cancer
- Opportunity to engage with local history projects

“Our Journeys“ StoryTent project

We worked with our friends at **Rich Mix** on a programme that:

- shared the heritage and experience of our participants' journeys, by creating an 'Our Journeys' StoryTent for use as a school resource for pupils and their families and for local exhibition
- connected people through sharing stories, fostering a sense of belonging and wellbeing.

The participants were from a wide range of backgrounds and life experiences.

Alongside personal histories, objects and documents from our collections relating to the diversity of Tower Hamlets, its textile trade and its migration histories were used to prompt discussion to create the tent, showing each person's rich and varied journey to the area.

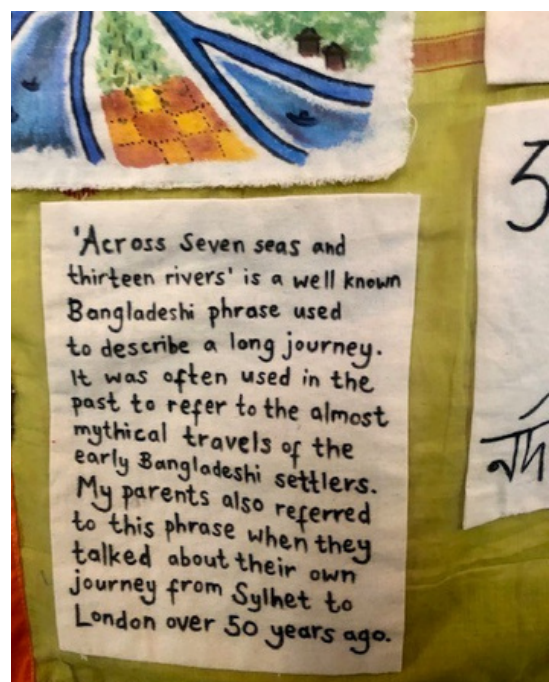
We led on three workshops, and received very positive feedback:

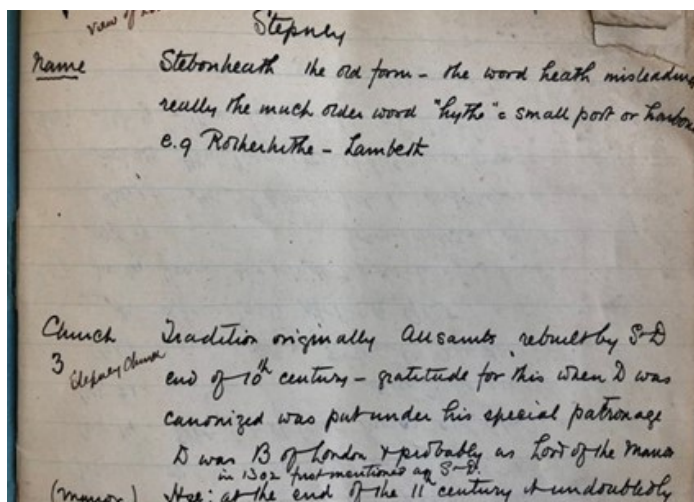

Notes by Sydney Maddocks (1870-1953) on the early origins of Stepney, ref: P/MDS/1/2

Archives of two important local historians catalogued

We released online catalogue descriptions to the archives of two local historians.

The papers of Sydney Maddocks (Ref: [P/MDS](#)) are a fine example of a personal research archive. In his lifetime, Maddocks was widely acknowledged as an expert on the history of East London. His papers include notes on church architecture, short biographies of local people, information from many sources about streets, taverns, events and past industries and much more.

Bradley Snooks, a local historian and resident of Bow has carried out extensive historical research and taken many photographs depicting Bow which are deposited with us (Ref: [P/SNO](#)).

A member of the East London History Society, he has researched the history of Bow and its streets including their origin and meaning. This collection of photographs are mounted on card, titled, and arranged alphabetically by street. We are grateful to Bradley for depositing his collection with us.

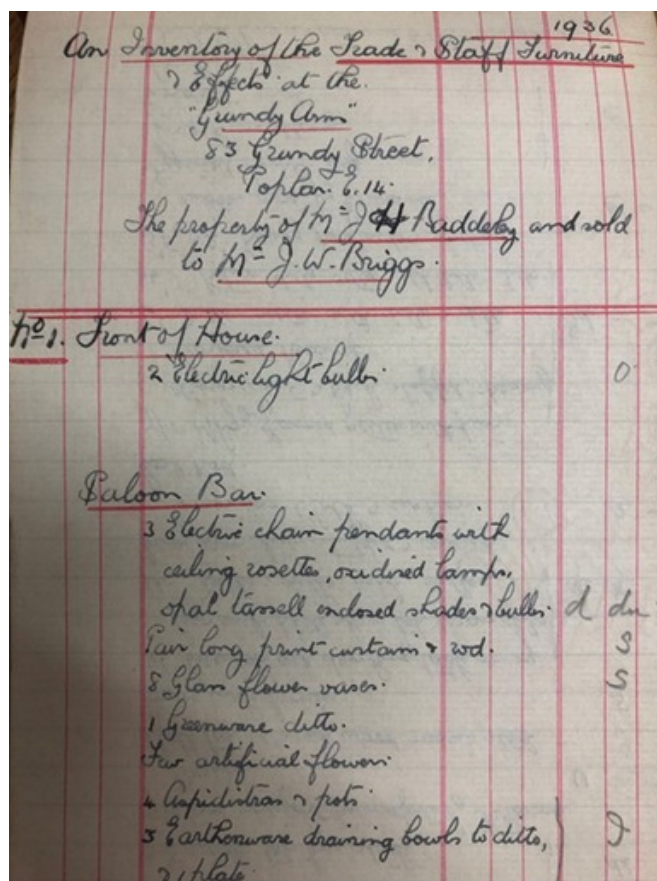
Jones, Son and Day: a great source for public houses in the East End

We also released catalogue descriptions to the records of Jones, Son and Day, estate agents, of Commercial Road, Limehouse (B/JSD). Dating from 1912-1990s, the collection reflects their specialism as licensed property valuers.

The firm was the main Agents to Taylor Walker and Company whose brewery in Limehouse closed in 1958.

The highlight for researchers is a substantial series of day books, 1932-1964. These contain detailed inventories and settlement statements for Public Houses to be sold or let.

There is a helpful index to the series.

The company was founded by William Jones in White Horse Road, Stepney, in 1828. He purchased 586 Commercial Road (4 Brunswick Cottages) in 1863 for the sum of £600. He later took into partnership his son, Harry, who, surviving his Father, took into partnership in 1901, Mr. P. H. Day.

LIBRARY COLLECTION

New additions to the catalogue

Between April 2022 and March 2023 the local history library added around 600 items to our catalogued collections. This included both newly purchased stock, gifts and donations, plus material from our cataloguing backlog. Some notable additions from 2022-23 include:



- Our extensive collection of Oversize Pamphlets, including many rare local publications and periodicals dating back to the early 19th century
- The remaining items from our Sound Collection cataloguing project, comprising over 100 historic audio recordings on vinyl, audiocassette, and open reel tapes
- 72 historic building plans
- 109 photographs

66 new books on a variety of local topics were catalogued into our collections, including:

- The mercenary river: private greed, public good: a history of London's water by Nick Higham (LC15381)
- A history of council housing in 100 estates by John Boughton (LC15419)
- From Sylhet to Spitalfields: Bengali Squatters in 1970s East London by Shabna Begum (LC1542)
- The Irish diaspora: tales of emigration, exile and imperialism by Turtle Bunbury (LC15474)

Unlocking the Jewish East End's sound heritage

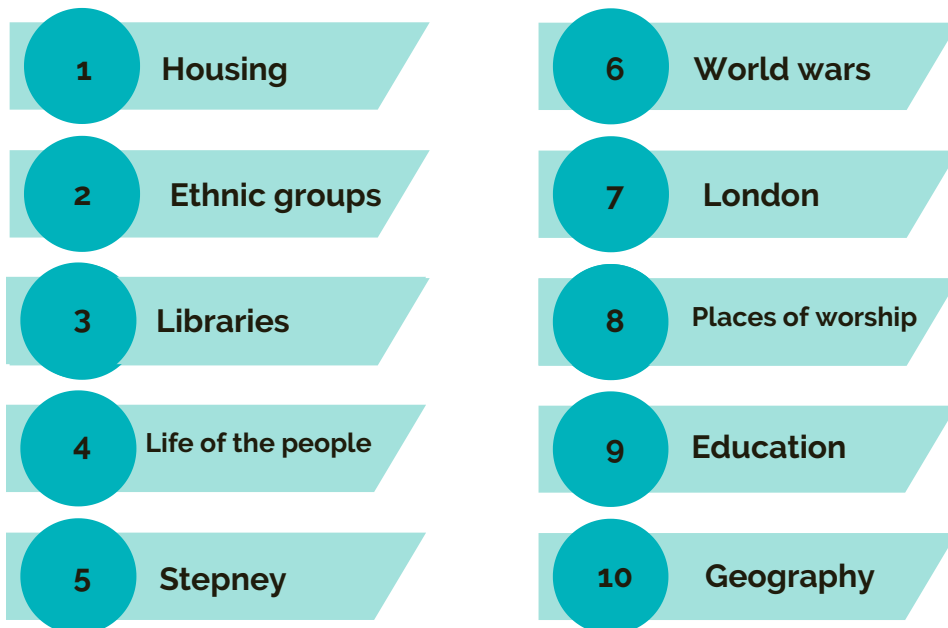


Our recently catalogued sound collection includes unique oral history recordings on reel-to-reel and audiocassette tapes which went unheard for decades. These tapes have now been digitised, along with sound recordings relating to the borough's Jewish history. These include:

- Interviews with Battle of Cable Street veterans
- Childhood reminiscences by well-known East Enders, including Lionel Bart, Bernard Bresslaw and Georgia Brown
- Historic radio broadcasts on topics ranging from Yiddish theatre to local synagogues
- Lectures on Jewish topics recorded at Tower Hamlets Central Library
- Audio documentaries produced in the 1980s by the Springboard Education Trust

This digitisation was made possible thanks to funding from Professor Nadia Valman's current AHRC-funded project **'Making and Remaking the Jewish East End'** at Queen Mary, University of London.

Exhibitions

Feeding the Hamlets

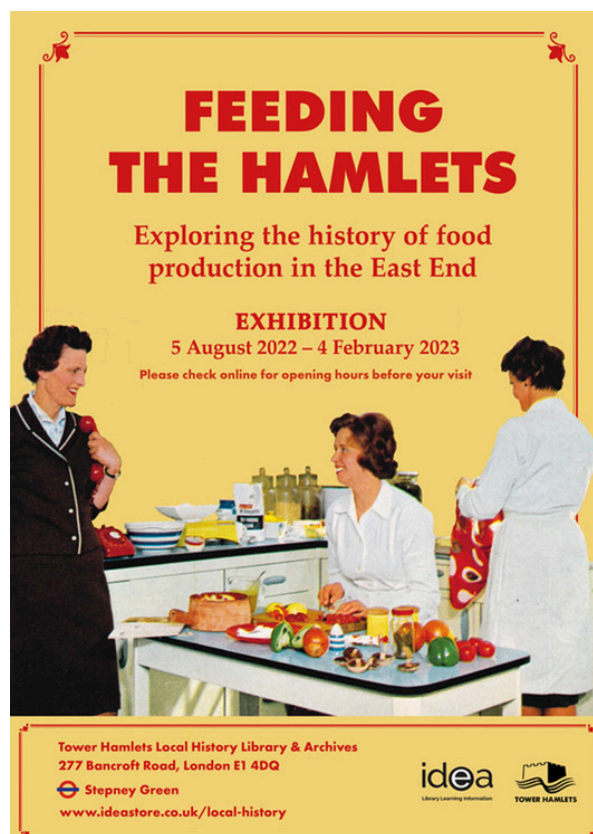
August 2022-February 2023

In planning since 2019 but delayed by the pandemic, our exhibition showcased the borough's history of food production, and was visited by 1,030 people.

Unique items including photographs, plans, deeds and maps were selected from our collections by staff to illustrate the many tales of food production in the East End, from flour milling and sugar refining to cow-keeping and vegetable growing. The exhibition looked at the methods and places where food production took place, as well as the people involved.

329 people attended the programme of free events which explored the themes in more detail, including:

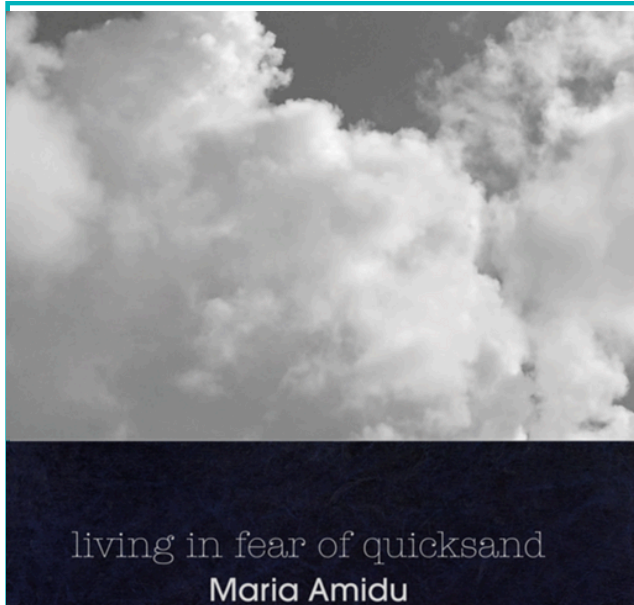
- A talk with Esther and Ray Rinkoff about the history of Rinkoff's Bakery, established in 1911
- 200 Years of Regent's Canal Industries: a talk by local historian Carolyn Clark on working lives in the food businesses in the area
- Soup kitchens and Spitalfields: a talk by Phil Carstairs on feeding the migrant poor in the 18th-19th century East End, with a focus on Jewish soup kitchens
- Isle of Dogs Factory Memories: an all-day event presented by members of The Friends of Island History Trust, exploring the history and legacy of the famous firms Maconochie's, Morton's, McDougall's and Tate & Lyle
- A Foraging walk at Tower Hamlets Cemetery led by Rasheeqa Ahmad

living in fear of quicksand

February-May 2023

The early months of 2023 saw the solo exhibition "living in fear of quicksand" by artist Maria Amidu taking place across two venues – THLHLA and the Nunnery Gallery in Bow.

The work on display at our site attracted 350 visitors and focused on the architectural and social history of the Lincoln Estate in Bow Common. Designed in the 1950s, the Estate includes Sleaford House – a 19-storey block of 90 maisonettes where the artist lived in the 1970s.

Maria unearthed council correspondence from our collections. These, as well as plans, drawings and newspaper cuttings about the Estate, played an integral role in developing the artworks. A selection of them were displayed with items from Maria's personal archive, accompanied by a timeline of the development of the Estate.

The exhibition at the Nunnery Gallery in Bow showed five new artworks. These included a print work, a text-based installation, a film piece, a sound work, and a bespoke paint colour

Local Landscapes

May 2022

The streets, canals, parks and buildings of Tower Hamlets were featured in Local Landscapes, an exhibition by students of Idea Store Learning's Visual Arts courses, which ran between February and May 2022. The exhibition included a guided tour by the artists themselves.

These local artists, inspired by tutor Virginia Hawke drew, painted, printed and collaged their own personal snapshots of the borough's landscape. Scenes ranged from landmarks as famous as the Tower of London and One Canada Square to more modest houses, flats, and street markets. A selection of historic maps and other items from our collections relevant to each location were presented alongside the artworks.

Events and Workshops

Bengali Resistance in the East End

An all-day event exploring how the Bengali community in Tower Hamlets resisted organised racism and violence.

Speakers and workshops included:

- Ansar Ahmed Ullah from the Swadhinata Trust on the impact of the 1971 Bangladesh Liberation war on activism in Tower Hamlets in 1978
- The MayDay Rooms archive exploring the Housing Struggle and Bengali squatters movement
- An inter-generational conversation between Shuva Motin (1978 activist working with Progressive Youth Organisation) and Julie Begum (Swadhinata Trust), discussing female activism over the last five decades.

Celebrate! The street where you live

In the run-up to the Platinum Jubilee in June 2022, we hosted an event to showcase our archives, illustrating historic street parties in the East End, from the Peace Parties of 1919 to the 2012 Olympics.

The day's events included:

- A Family creative workshop making bunting and pennants
- A talk on Researching the history of your house delivered by Robert Jones, our local history librarian
- Independent researcher Rachel Sweeney shared her process for uncovering the history of her house in Bow using our resources

Recalling October 1936: The archives and activism of the Cable Street Group

Heritage Officer Andrew Lewis gave a talk on the Cable Street Group records (S/CSG), a community organisation dedicated to preserving the memory of those who stopped the British Union of Fascists marching through the then predominantly Jewish area.

Andrew explained the challenging nature of the records from an archival perspective, outlined cataloguing methods and suggested how they can be used by those interested not only in the Battle but also life in Cable Street and the East End in the 1930s.

- A reminiscence workshop for The Bow Geezers using the David Granick image collection
- A research workshop for Khidr Collective around South Asian activism in Tower Hamlets
- One collection-based research session and two research support sessions for the Trinity Buoy Wharf project.

Education and Outreach

Educational sessions delivered between 2022-23

'**This Is Our Local History**' was a project funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund delivered in partnership with the Tower Hamlets Schools Library Service (SLS). Pupils in schools across the borough visited us to take part in workshops on five local history topics using primary and secondary sources across the collections to support curriculum-based learning. This project also included 'an introduction to the collections' workshop for SLS staff and teachers in the borough.

Other pupils' workshops were also delivered to both primary and secondary schools throughout the borough focusing on local history topics such as the Match Girls' Strike, Victorian London, and Our Local Area. Sessions were delivered both onsite and at the schools, reaching over 650 pupils from Years 1 to 6.

Talks, tours and visits

We hosted talks and tours for:

- [University of the Third Age \(u3a\) Group](#) in May 2022
- [The Museum of the Home](#) in June 2022, about the Vietnamese community in the East End. This workshop focused on recently catalogued archives about the Gor Hoi Festival kept by Peter Gibson ([I/THI/B/15/1](#)). The results supported a series of events [Uncovering Vietnamese Archives with Dora Lam](#), held at the Museum of the Home from March 2023
- a delegation of Nigerian archive and records managers, arranged by The National Archives in August 2022.

Visits from young people and students interested in cultural heritage included the UCL New Curators Project in June 2022 and the QMUL Public History Seminar in October 2022.

Both sessions were designed to support their engagement and potential for future employment in the heritage sector.

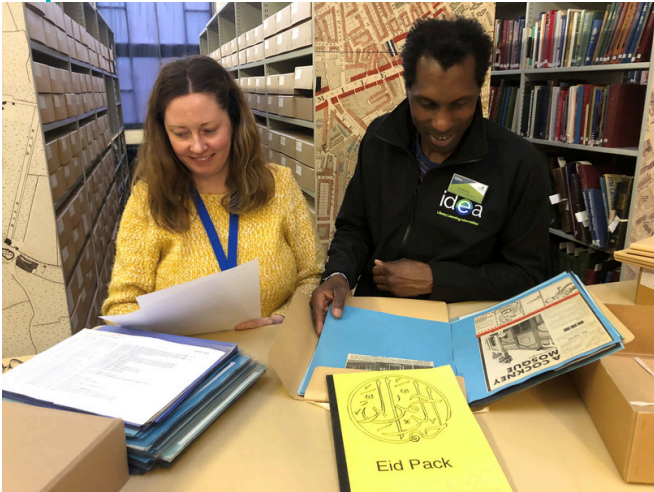
