The exhibition continues


From 'The Blind Beggar of Bethnal Green' to 'Bonkers', the people of London's East End have always appreciated a good tune. Our unique history, shaped by its connection to the river as a source of inspiration, work and migration has produced an extraordinary musical legacy, spanning everything from folk songs and sea shanties to music hall, jazz, punk, the Asian underground and grime. Featuring over a hundred rare items selected by staff from the collections of Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives, Cockney Rebels: Popular Music in Tower Hamlets, 1624-2003 is a major new exhibition exploring how our borough and its people have inspired and shaped popular music, both locally and globally, over four centuries.

We also had some great publicity thanks to the lead curator (our local history librarian Rob Jones) appearing on the BBC London Robert Elms show! 

"The Godfather" of the reference library



Earlier this month we were amazed to receive a visit from a family historian with a special link to our building. Paul Peterken, pictured above, is the great-grandson of Mr **H.G. Peterken**, **J.P.** of Three Colt Street, Limehouse, who was a long serving public servant for Stepney during the late 19th and early 20th century.

As Chairman of the Libraries Committee for the new Metropolitan Borough of Stepney, he "materially assisted in securing the Carnegie donation to build the Borough Reference Library at Mile End" - the beautifully ornate room which is our present day Reading Room! So great was his influence that Cllr Peterken was referred to at the official opening as "the Godfather of the Reference Library".

Cllr Peterken had many roles over the years and received a special commendation for his work on the scene of the 1917 Upper North Street School air raid in which eighteen Poplar schoolchildren were killed. Fifty Years in Limehouse and Poplar

On Thursday, Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Peterken, of 63, Three Colt Street, Limehouse, celebrated their Golden Wedding and were the recipients of many

congratulatory messages. They were married on 13th June, 1885, at Poplar Wesleyan Church, where both were in the Choir, and they have seven sons and daughters living and nine grand-

children.

This makes the third successive golden wedding in the family, Mr. Peterken's grandparents and also his father and mother attaining this notable anniversary. In each case the husbands are eldest sons and all have lived in Poplar, where for over 100 years the family have carried on the well-known printing business of that name. They came from Inverness to Limehouse in 1662, and are practically the oldest family in the district. Mr. and Mrs. Peterken have lived in Three Colt Street for 49 out of their 50 years

of married life.

Mr. Peterken, who was appointed a Justice of the Peace for the Tower Division in 1924, has done much public work being a member of the old Limehouse Vestry. For 9½ years he was on the Limehouse District Board of Works, before the Stepney Borough Council came into existence, and for 19 years he served as an elected Councillor on the Council for the Limehouse South Ward, representing the Ratepayers and Municipal

Reform Party. As Chairman of the Libraries Committee, he materially assisted in securing the Carnegie donation to build the Borough Reference Library at Mile End. work in this connection was recognised at the opening of the Library, when the late Dr. Stanley Atkinson informed the Duke of Argyle at the opening that Mr. Peterken was the "Godfather" of the Reference Library. He has at different times been Chairman of the General Purposes and the Works Committees, also being the Stepney Council representative on the Metropolitan Water Board and on the Lee Conservancy Board

Mr. Peterken has always taken a great interest in education, and is a manager of nine local schools, Nos. 3 and 4 Groups, Thomas Street Central School and Limehouse Church School. With the exception of the Church School he is Vice-Chairman of each body of local

school managers.

During the war, Mr. Peterken was an Inspector of the Special Constabulary at Limehouse, and in that capacity he did between 1,200 and 1,300 duties in the four years and three months of the war. Together with eight other men, he was specially commended for work performed in the first daylight air raid at Poplar, when many children were bombed and killed.

Quiet and modest by nature, Mr. Peterken never seeks the limelight, but he is popular with all business men and those who work with him for the public good, among whom he has gained a reputation for dependability, good sense and integrity of the highest order.

Thursday's anniversary was celebrated by a family gathering at his residence, and was a happy culmination to a useful

and fine life.
