Job vacancy: Heritage Trainee

Based at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives

Scale 5: £24,618 - £26,658

Full-time, fixed term until March 2021

Closing date: Sunday 7 April

This is a great (and extremely rare) opportunity for someone inexperienced in this field to develop their skills by working with a large and unique collection documenting the histories of London's East End and its communities. This is an entry-level post aimed at someone interested in pursuing a career in the archives, library or heritage sector. We do not recommend applying if you are already qualified and/or have significant paid work experience in this area already. It is intended that the postholder will complete the new Level 3 Apprenticeship in Library, Archive & Information Services Assistant during their employment.

The postholder will gain hands-on experience and on-the-job training in assisting members of the public in using our library and archive collections, helping to preserve and catalogue them, and developing outreach activities and events inspired by them.

We particularly encourage applicants from Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) backgrounds who are substantially underrepresented in the UK heritage sector workforce.

The untold stories of first-generation Bangladeshi women in the East End (1970-2000)

Do you want to be involved in researching and documenting the lives of these women? Are you interested in sharing findings and the stories of these women with the wider community? 

The project will explore the experiences of Bangladeshi women home seamstresses in East London. Many such women are in their 60s and 70s now and represent a very little known, but highly significant, East End heritage. They have incredible stories to share as being the first-generation Bangladeshi women in East London who worked from home as seamstresses to support their families and contributed so much to society and economy while making many sacrifices of their own health and dreams.

The project will be delivered through engaging community participants in a voluntary capacity and equipping them with a range of relevant training provided by Oral History professionals, Tower Hamlets Local History Library and Archives and London Metropolitan Archives. Outcomes of the project include a collection of oral history, a book, an exhibition and a drama performance. The oral history, photographs and documents generated will be deposited at the Tower Hamlets Local History Library and Archives.

Painting the Hamlets



Our current main exhibition **Painting the Hamlets** has been extended through til the beginning of June. Artists' talk: Socially-engaged art practice in Tower Hamlets

Thursday 18 April, 6.30-7.45pm

Visual artists Kinsi Abdulleh and Saif Osmani will explore their socially engaged art practice over many years of working with the Somali and Bangladeshi communities in Tower Hamlets. Through their work, both artists have explored a wide range of issues including race and identity, gender and social justice, space and the public realm, language and cultural heritage. In addition to the above events, we have organised **East End Urban Sketching Club**, a series of three free painting and drawing workshops led by Idea Store Learning visual arts tutor Ginny Hawke, in which participants will be taught different methods of creating their own street scenes. Spitalfields Community Association (S/SCA)

We are pleased to report that the records of the Spitalfields Community Association are now accessible in the reading room. The collection itself is a rich resource of information about the local area and particularly Spitalfields Market and the changes that took place from the late 80s to the mid-2000s.

The collection itself is records of a local community group that launched a strong campaign against the redevelopment of the market and managed to delay the redevelopment for 15 years! Through petitions, protests and judicial reviews using all and very means they were a vocal group that stood against the redevelopment. They not only successfully roused the local people to join them in their campaign but had the support of artists such as Tracy Emin and Lucinda Rogers and architect Will Alsop who produced alternative designs for the redevelopment.

The campaign, or rather that should be campaigns, began life in 1989 as the Campaign to Save Spitalfields from Developers or also known as the Save Spitalfields Campaign, who used the parliamentary forum of a Select Committee hearing against the changes to the Spitalfields Market Bill. While they were unsuccessful in stopping the Bill being passed, they did get an increase in planning gain for the local community. These records can found in reference S/SCA/1/3.

The Spitalfields Community Association was formed in April 1998 by local residents, tenants associations, small businesses and other organisations. They campaigned against various developments which included the Horner Buildings (S/SCA/2/3) and the development of Bishops Square (S/SCA/2/5) where the headquarters of the firm Allen and Overy is based.

In March 2000 the Spitalfields Market Under Threat (SMUT) was formed. They continued the campaign against the redevelopment, successfully launching a Judicial Review against the 2000 proposals submitted by Foster and Partners which had an increased amount of floorspace that was not consented for in the 1997 permissions by the London Borough of Tower Hamlets Council.

The records range from plans and drawings from various architects and development groups, photographs of the development and protests by the campaign, publicity material created by the campaign which include ladies underwear, and press about the campaign itself. These records weave an interesting and informative narrative of the development from the perspective of the objectors to the redevelopments. They are available to the public to come in and browse in our reading room - check our opening hours below!
