Unite & Resist! Protests in the East End 1970-2000 Launches

Our new exhibition which showcases original archives from our collections illustrating the prolific activism of the people of Tower Hamlets launched last month. We were pleased to welcome a busy entrance hall of friends, readers and colleagues on Thursday 5 September.

The exhibition which focuses on the latter decades of the twentieth century covers a wide range of protests, from the Stepney School Strike to the Battle of

Brick Lane, the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament and Stop Clause 28. The exhibition shines a light on these and other important moments in the borough's recent history including several lesser known struggles.

Exhibition Curator and Archives Manager Emma Harrold commented, "For us, this exhibition is quite different from many that have come before it. It allowed us to display a huge amount of archive material and you'll see more than 70 items from our rich, varied and interesting collections on display. Some of these collections are new to our archives, many have only just been catalogued, and all of the material here is being exhibited for the first time."

The display features banners, badges, garments, posters, photographs, pamphlets and other archives which provide important evidence of these sometimes short-lived campaigns.

As usual we have programmed an extensive range of free talks and events which is still being added to - see below for the first few dates for your diary. The exhibition is on until **February 15 2020**.

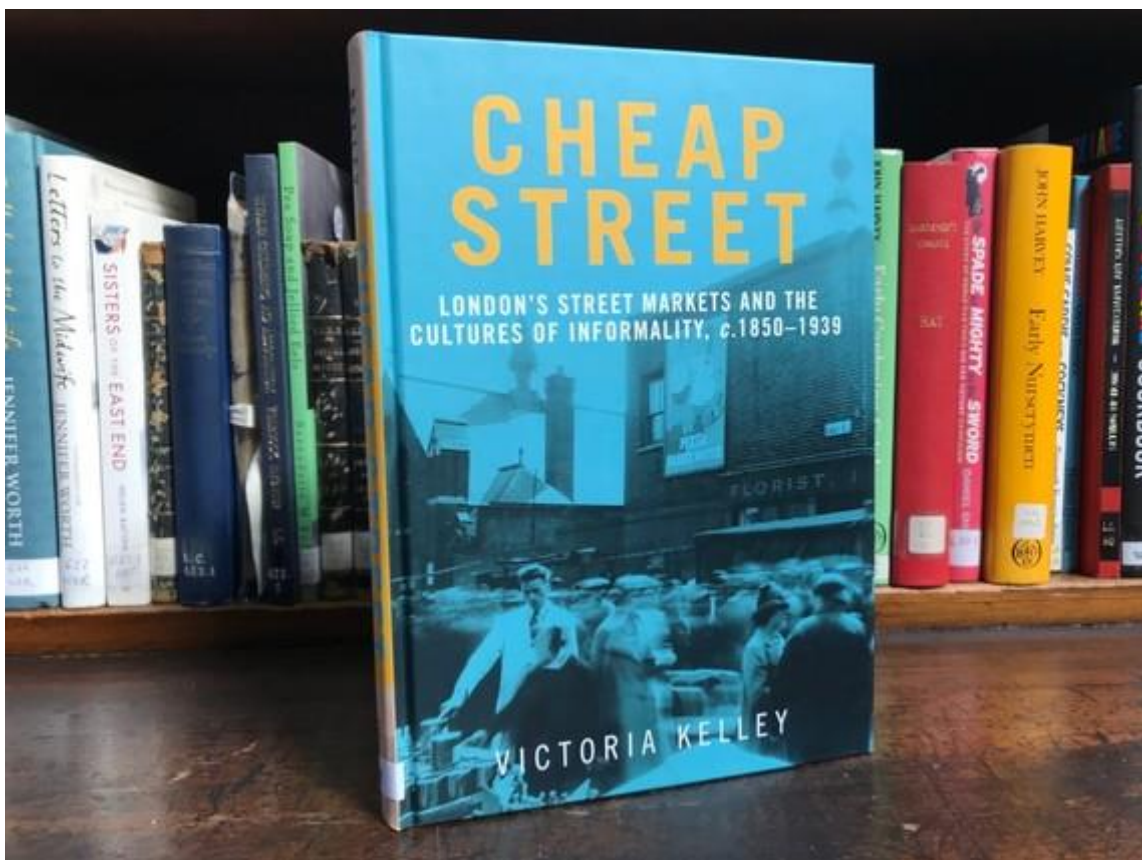
**Somali History Lab: Somali Protest in the East End

Library spotlight



Book spotlight: *Cheap Street: London's Street Markets and the Cultures of Informality, c. 1850-1939* by Victoria Kelley

We've added a range of interesting new titles to our Local History Library collection since the last newsletter. These include, among others, Lara Maiklem's *Mudlarking: Lost and Found on the River Thames*, *Britain's Jews in the First World War* by Paula Kitching, and this month's Book Spotlight *Cheap Street: London's Street Markets and the Cultures of Informality, c. 1850-1939* by Victoria Kelley.

The book, our copy of which was kindly donated by the author, tells the story of London's iconic street markets and the people who traded and shopped there from the late nineteenth to the early twentieth century. In particular it focuses on their unregulated, informal, and highly performative characters, and their impact

on the development of London's working class culture and identity. Partially researched using our own library and archive material, Kelley's book contains a wealth of material for those interested in the street markets of Tower Hamlets, including Columbia Road Flower Market, Spitalfields, Chrisp Street, Whitechapel Road and Petticoat Lane.

Lightboxes + Lettering by Rendezvous Projects, made possible by Heritage Lottery Fund, focuses on the pre-digital era of printing in Hackney, Tower Hamlets and Waltham Forest and the experiences of people involved in all aspects of the industry. Looking at how the printing industry changed with the arrival of digital technologies, and how newer processes transformed the lives of print workers.

Volunteers have been engaging in oral history interviews with current and former employees, and in digitising archive material collected from existing and private collections. This is one of a number of workshops, using some of the processes and exploring archive material, towards a series of leaflets for our final exhibition in January 2020 when the project ends, along with a publication.
