## Don't Just Live, Live To Be Remembered: The Somali East End

The first ever exhibition illustrating the history of Somali migration to Tower Hamlets will be hosted in March 2013. Produced by Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives in partnership with Bethnal Green-based KAYD Somali Arts & Culture, the exhibition draws on oral histories of influential and inspirational residents as well as the council's archive collections to tell the story of the Somali East End. These oral histories and new archives have been gathered during 2012-13 by Simeera Hassan as part of her heritage skills traineeship supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and The National Archives. The exhibition also features a striking set of portraits of Somali seamen and community leaders taken by local photographer Sarah Ainslie.

The exhibition runs at Oxford House from 8-31 March 2013 and will subsequently tour to Idea Stores and other venues in Tower Hamlets.

A programme of free public events throughout March is being held across various venues to tie in with this ground-breaking exhibition, including a launch reception on 8 March, Tracing Your Somali Family History IT workshop on 16 March, a reminiscence session with the seamen on 20 March and a film night on 28 March. In January, Tower Hamlets Local History Library and Archives hosted four Cockney Heritage research workshops for groups of students from the Idea Store Learning visual arts courses. #### **Cockney Heritage Festival**

The first Cockney Heritage Festival is being held in Tower Hamlets during July 2013, organised Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives in partnership with Cockney Heritage Trust. Events already confirmed include a launch at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives, a closing night knees-up at Bethnal Green Working Men's Club and a packed schedule of talks, film screenings and exhibitions including work produced by students on Idea Store Learning's visual arts programmes this spring. The festival will take place from 18-27 July at venues around the borough of Tower Hamlets and will explore themes such as cultural heritage (food, entertainment, traditions, work and play, language/idiom). It will also provide a platform for debating and exploring 'what is a Cockney?' There will be reminiscence sessions drawing on the borough's archival collections, events for children and families, screenings of rarely seen archival films and talks about the history of this important and unique part of London. ## **Archives Collection Development**

Work is continuing on the project to develop the Local History Library and Archives' holdings of records created by significant local businesses. One such business is Sneath's, which was established in 1898 and provides electrical and engineering services. In January a member of staff visited the Sneath Group premises in Solebay St and met with Mr John Veness and his mother Christine to discuss the family business. We look forward to building upon this introductory meeting and providing Mr Veness and his family with a tour of the Local History Library and Archives collections in due course. #### **Picture of the Month**



The Millwall and The Island Horse Omnibus outside West India Dock Station, c.1910

During the 1850s, the first one-horse omnibus began to operate between the Greenwich Ferry and Limehouse, helping to ease heavy traffic congestion on the Isle of Dogs, primarily caused by frequent queues at the Dock bridges. By the 1870s, a number of private horse omnibuses were in operation throughout the island. The bus driver would collect fares through a hatch in the roof of the vehicle. The 'Millwall and The Island' horse omnibus, pictured, served West Ferry Road and Millwall Docks and operated until 16th October 1913, the year during which the London General Omnibus Company introduced motor-bus services.

## **Building works update**

We regret that we have experienced further delays in our current building works. The roof works have not yet started on site due to the unforeseen need to negotiate a legal licence with neighbours to permit the roofing contractors to erect scaffolding on land adjacent to the 1860 part of the building. This process is nearly complete and we expect a February start on site with works to the reading room roof complete first. This would enable us to reopen to the public in late spring. In better news, our new lift is due to be handed over this week making the first floor fully accessible to wheelchair users for the first time. We regret the inconvenience our continued closure causes to patient researchers and remind you that staff continue to provide as much research help as we can to enquiries made by phone and email during our closure.

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
