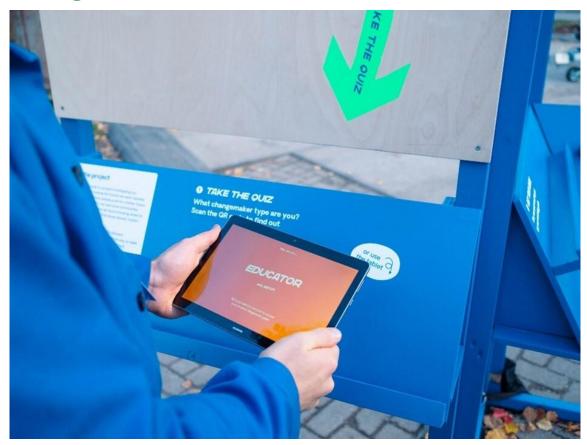

- Saturday 4 May, 1.00-4.00 pm: Using design and creativity to tell the stories of the people that inspire us to the rest of the East London community.

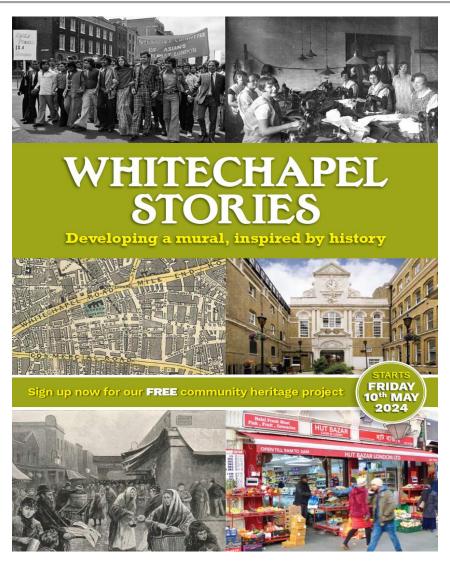
What's in it for you?

Help create a new mural on Sidney Street

Whitechapel has a rich and varied history. The local streets, shops and landmark buildings all have their own stories. And diverse communities have made their home here. We are pleased to be supporting this new project, supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, whichs aim to research and gather some of Whitechapel's remarkable stories and use them to create a new heritage mural on Sidney Street in autumn 2024.

Over a series of eight weekly hands-on history workshops, guided walks, and online research sessions, participants will take a closer look at the neighbourhood. We'll use old maps, photographs, newspapers and other historical records to explore how Whitechapel has developed over the years.

Informed by this research, we'll work together to shape up ideas for the new Sidney Street mural, as well as an accompanying booklet and website. It's a chance to make your own mark on Whitechapel's history!

#### Who's it for?

The project is open to all Tower Hamlets residents. Whatever your interest in Whitechapel's communities and history, you'll get something out of this project. The workshops are pitched at a level that is accessible to all and everyone will be supported. If you're new to exploring local history, we'll give you a helping hand, and if you're more experienced, this will offer an interesting theme on which to hone your research skills.

#### When and where?

The project runs on eight Fridays, from 10am – 1pm, starting on Friday 10 May and ending on Friday 28 June 2024. Sessions take place at various locations: at Tower Hamlets Local History Library and Archives, an IT suite at Queen Mary University, and on local guided walks. When you sign up, you'll receive full joining instructions.

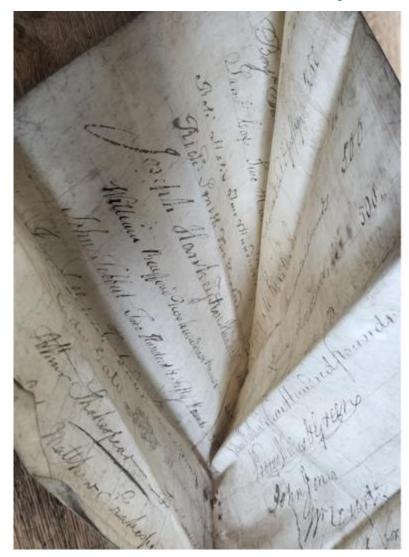

# A visual arts exhibition

28 March - 1 June 2024

### Featuring

Holly Graham Rudy Loewe Basil Olton Diensen Pamben Kelly Wu

What We Have Become is a group exhibition including painting and drawing, photography, collage, film and sculpture, responding to Stuart Hall's idea of cultural identity being formed from "points of deep significant difference".

The artists' work explores the impacts of silence and erasure in archival records created and kept by the British state about people of colour – for example, the destruction of Home Office immigration records which caused the Windrush Scandal – and how the violence implicit in the destruction of archival records may be reproduced as a rupture in the sense of self, identity and belonging.

Casting the exhibition as a space of healing and reconciliation, the artists evoke new narratives emphasising the contributions, resilience and rich cultural heritage of communities of colour, with the histories of Black and Asian Britons retold on their own terms.

The exhibiting artists are Holly Graham, Rudy Loewe, Diensen Pamben, Kelly Wu and Basil Olton.

A range of events are being organised to explore the themes of the exhibition.

# Archival breaks, gaps and silences

### Thursday 16 May | 6.30 - 8.00pm | Online talk

Utilising the archive as a mode of expression and social document, this online panel discussion with all of the participating artists will explore the gaps within the archive that invite us to engage critically with the silenced voices and obscured histories that underpin its very existence and its relationship to artistic practice. Based on the writings of Stuart Hall and his essay 'Constituting the Archive', the panel will discuss how the archive has influenced their work and the connection between memory and meaning.
