# Out of the Box exhibition

We are very pleased to be launching our next exhibition **Out of the Box** on Wednesday 3 December, coinciding with the United Nations' International Day of Disabled People.

'Out of the Box' is a pioneering project that invited local disabled people to take the lead in bringing archives 'out of the box', exploring them and asserting their own personal local histories through a creative practice of their choice.

Through a series of workshops, participants followed personal journeys into Tower Hamlets Council's heritage collections, engaging with sound and oral history, handwritten archives on parchment, newspapers, painting and photographs.

Their inspiration, thoughts and findings from their in-depth research is captured in their own artwork: from sculptures and hand-made cushions, to drawings and poems such as Limehouse Lures, "a fictional tale inspired by all the newspaper cuttings I read about Chinatown when it was based in Limehouse." (Rowan, participant).



Community Housing Film Night Thursday 20 November, 6.30-7.30pm Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives

A chance to see two rarely screened films that explore themes of social cohesion and community housing. Free, no need to book.

*The Selby Street Story Project* short film was produced as a record of the Selby Street Story Project, an intergenerational theatre project that took place in Whitechapel in 2013. Weekly creative participatory sessions led to a performance adapted from the traditional Korean folk tale, The Story Bag, which was performed locally to a packed house. Participants were aged between 4 and 88. The project was funded by the Community Development Foundation and supported by One Housing Group, Southern Housing Group and the Selby Estate Tenants Association. *4 minutes.* 

14th Floor was produced jointly by THLHLA and Bow Arts Trust in 2010 to illustrate the pioneering development of social housing in Tower Hamlets from the Victorian period to the present day. Funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, this rarely screened short documentary includes personal interviews with residents, housing officers, architects and artists (including those

residing in the Balfron Tower) - and of course the Borough Archivist. 45 minutes


Do you have a passion for old pictures? Fond memories of forgotten streets? Are you curious about archive collections?

### **Recent Events at THLHLA**

Queen Mary University students delve into our collections!

On Monday 20 October we hosted a visit from Geography postgraduate students studying at Queen Mary, University of London (QMUL). This is the second year we have worked in partnership with QMUL Archives to offer students a two-part introduction to the wealth of archive resources on their doorstep. The format of the workshop allows a group of students the chance to visit QMUL archives and THLHLA on the same day, to learn about the different collections held in both which are likely to be of relevance to them in their studies.

After visiting QMUL archives the students arrived at THLHLA and were given a short introduction to our service and collections. They spent the rest of the

session exploring the library and archive collections looking at various maps; pamphlets, images and publications about Queen Mary College, the People's Palace and other parts of borough including photographs from the 'Down Wapping' collection and press cuttings relating to the former Chinatown in Limehouse. They also handled archive records relating to churches; schools; businesses; societies and individuals (including registers; photograph albums; deeds; and World War One Tribunal records) and listened to extracts from oral history interview recordings.

### Time Travellers visit Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives!

Local children aged 4 to 12 joined film-maker and animator Melissa Rees-Herman in foraging through historical images to inspire backgrounds for their stop-motion animations this October. The children used copies of early 19th century images of Whitechapel, featuring the hay market and old St Mary's church. They designed their own time traveller character, who then, with the help of Melissa's expertise, took a walk back through time!

# Dan Jones Events Programme gets local residents' creative juices flowing...

Campaign poster making, lino cut printing, drawing, creative writing and poetry were just some of the pursuits on offer for free to visitors to the varied and vibrant programme of events planned to coincide with this exhibition.

However, most inspiring of all was the presence of Dan himself to give personal insight to the stories behind his pictures and fire up the imaginations of both young and not-so-young. Aided at times by friends such as poet and writer Alan Gilbey, Dan co-hosted over a dozen events with us at THLHLA and at Idea Stores.

Highlights included rare archive footage of the 1973 E1 festival in Stepney as depicted in several of Dan's paintings and prints, in the screening of BBC documentary Alright, We'll Do It Ourselves. This featured a Q&A with Dan and the film's director Jenny Barraclough.

### **Idea Store Secondment**

Following on from their introduction in our last newsletter, Rudy Lorentz writes:

I can hardly believe that I've been at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives four months now. In the time that I have been here, I have helped to develop and deliver our programme of events to coordinate with the Dan Jones exhibition. This has included cofacilitating printmaking workshops with Dan and liaising with school groups. As a result of my secondment. I have been able to create better links between the work that I do at THLHLA and the work that I do

in my normal job as Co-ordinator at Idea Store Watney Market - such as the workshops for young people we have now held at Idea Store Watney Market with Dan Jones.

As part of Black History Month, I facilitated a day of workshops at THLHLA with another local artist – Evan Ifekoya. The event was called 'Here We Are: Black History in Tower Hamlets Creative Workshops'. In the sessions attendees explored material from the library and archive collections relating to black history in the local area. The workshops looked to extract the examples of black history that were already present but not necessarily visible in the collections.

Prior to Black History Month, I was unearthing and noting where in the collections these moments of black history existed - especially those that are most humanising in first person accounts – such as the numerous oral history recordings, Abdi Haji's autobiography or the books about Walter Tull, Britain's first black footballer. This work has allowed me to gather enough material to now create a pamphlet for future THLHLA users who are looking for black history in the borough. I am now continuing to do the same thing for strands of queer and QTIPOC (queer/ trans/ intersex people of colour) history in the borough. I am very much interested in identifying what is already there and finding a way to highlight it to those who want to find it.

I have really enjoyed working with the team at THLHLA and feel like I have learned a lot through my secondment about the kinds of work that they do and about local history. I hope to continue this link after my work here finishes.


I will also be leading a creative workshop on making QTIPOC histories visible at 'Lines of Dissent', the annual LGBT History & Archives conference taking place at London Metropolitan Archives at 2.30pm on **Saturday 6 December**. I will also be organising a QTIPOC heritage day at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives as part of LGBTQ History Month next year, planned for **Saturday 7 February 2015**.

### 'Land and Lives': Bromley-by-Bow

In the last edition of our newsletter, we anticipated that the Land and Lives project would be concentrating on deeds related to Whitechapel for a while. Although we have now completed work on the deeds relating to this area which were transferred to us from Tower Hamlets Council and its predecessors, work on deeds from this area deriving from other, unofficial sources will now be postponed. Due to funding constraints unfortunately we need to reduce the scope of the deeds to be completed before funding for my post runs out at the end of March 2015. Alternative sources of funding are being sought to complete work on the remainder of the deeds in a second phase later in the year.

From October until the conclusion of the project next spring, we are prioritising all records relating to the parish of Bromley St Leonard, now known as Bromley-by-Bow, in the "deeds collection" regardless of source. This is for reasons connected to the project's financial support from the Heritage Lottery Fund: it will allow us to run the full range of connected activities that have been planned for the project, but for a specific, more focussed area. As well as the recataloguing and repackaging, next spring there will be an exhibition of some of the Bromley deeds, a free public seminar about the project and the deeds completed thus far, and a written guide to using the collection for researching the Bromley-by-Bow area. In addition, we will be offering local history workshops for schools in or adjacent to the Bromley North, Bromley South and Lansbury wards, in which the deeds will play a part, as they have plenty to tell us about what was happening in this vicinity in the 19th century. If readers have connections with primary or secondary schools from these areas whose pupils may like to participate in a local history project in the spring or summer term next year, please get in touch using our usual contact details. The same goes for community groups or other local organisations.

Going still further back, I have now re-catalogued the deeds of the Four Mills site in Bromley, dating from the 17th and early 18th centuries, which show the site being used for watermills, then corn mills, and then cloth beating. A number of powerful or influential men took a stake in it, starting with Sir Arthur Ingram, who would seem to have acquired it with the manor of Bromley in James I's reign. The mills are not to be confused with the Three Mills, on the eastern bank of the River Lea, though one merchant, George Godfrey, owned the leasehold of both for a time. Nor were there always just four of them!

### **Call for volunteers**



The events ran from 1948 to 1965 when the Poplar Borough Council became part of Tower Hamlets.
