

A talk by Phil Carstairs

Spitalfields and Poplar have always been a place for London's new arrivals to set up home -Huguenot refugees in the early eighteenth century followed by Irish, Jewish and Asian immigrants in the nineteenth. During hard times, many of these new arrivals relied on soup kitchens that became famous, run by the local community or even celebrity chefs, reported on by national newspapers and even discussed in Parliament.

We are delighted to welcome Philip Carstairs from the University of Leicester who will be giving this talk on feeding the migrant poor in the 18th-19th century East End, with a focus

on Jewish soup kitchens. There will be a selection of relevant materials on display from Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives collections.

The archives and activism of the Cable Street Group

The Battle of Cable Street is one of the most important events in the history of 20th century London, but decades before smartphones and all of the other devices that can now capture 'instant history' how was this seminal day recorded for posterity? There are a number of contemporary photographs and newsreels, some of which have become iconic, but there are other sources to be found in our collection here at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives which can throw light on what happened on 4 October 1936.

Join our Heritage Officer **Andrew Lewis** as he discusses the recently catalogued records of the Cable Street Group, a community-based organisation dedicated to keeping alive the memory and example of those who came together in October 1936 to stop the British Union of Fascists marching through what was then a predominantly Jewish neighbourhood.

Andrew will explain the challenging nature of the records from an archival perspective, outline the way they have been catalogued and suggest how they might be used by those interested not only in the Battle but also life in Cable Street and the East End in the 1930s. With very few individuals of that generation now left, he will also offer some personal reflections on the nature of collective memory and public history.

She is an instigator of the Community Apothecary in her locality, a project that brings community members together around a patchwork of medicinal herb gardens where they can learn about growing, wildcrafting and making medicines together.

Exploring the histories of food production in the East End

More information about our current exhibition Feeding the Hamlets

In production since 2019 but delayed by the pandemic, *Feeding the Hamlets* is the brandnew exhibition at Tower Hamlets Local History & Archives, using the unique collections held here as a lens through which to explore the borough's history of producing food.


For centuries, the East End's landscape and social and economic history have been influenced by the growing, trading or manufacturing of food. Before 1800 farmland and market gardens characterised the area, but rapid industrialisation saw this pastoral tradition give way to the factories and warehouses producing food for mass consumption nationwide and globally. Close proximity to the docks ensured that food businesses based in the East End had ready access to a fresh supply of raw ingredients, within many supplies imported from countries colonised by Britain.

Photographs, deeds, plans, minutes, illustrations and maps are among the many unique items selected by staff. These sources illustrate fascinating and lesser-known tales from the history of food production in the East End – from flour milling and sugar refining to cow-keeping and vegetable growing. The exhibition looks at the methods and sites where food production took place, as well as the people who were involved.

Huge thanks to all archive staff whose hard work made this exhibition possible - particularly Medha Chotai, Sanjida Alam and Genova Messiah who really went the extra mile in getting the very complex exhibition researched, designed and installed and organising the brilliant launch event last night.

A programme of free events is taking place to explore the exhibition's themes in more detail. More will be added later in the year. The exhibition is on display in the entrance hall during our opening times.
